ECS continues to work hard learning uppercase and lowercase letters of the alphabet and letter sounds. During class we use Animated Literacy and Handwriting Without Tears programs to help develop correct printing formations of letters. Practice counting sequence to 30, building quantities to 10, and adding numbers together to make 5.

We have many Christmas activities, crafts, and school events coming up in the month of December. Stay healthy everyone!











November was a great month in grade 1. The students continue to work on developing their phonetic knowledge of the alphabet through work on letter recognition and the corresponding sounds, proper letter formation and transferring this understanding when reading and writing words. Students have been working hard to increase their recognition of high frequency words. By the end of the year, the goal is for students to automatically read 125 high frequency words. Students finished their first unit on measurement in November. December will see us working on 2-D shapes and then we will be starting another unit on number sense where students will work on increasing their understanding of numbers to 100.

Grade 2/3





Greetings to all families!

In language arts- students have been working on LLI to support reading, writing and fluency skills. They are also completing spelling weekly and working on comprehension skills.

In Math– students are finishing up the measurement units and moving onto probability and data.

In Social- students are learning about different communities- Gr 2 are learning about the prairies and what life is like in that community. Gr 3- are learning about global issues in particular The Red Cross Organization, climate change and how to help wildlife.

In Science– Gr. 2 students are starting the building objects section with coding capabilities. They will get to design their own robot!. Gr 3 are learning about what is matter? What are the phases of matter and eventually particle theory. So far we have one student that has finished the Wampum belt and others are still working on it.

We have invited settlement elder Mr. Allan Wells to come in and speak to the class about the history of the settlement. Thank you for sharing your knowledge with us!

Grade 4/5

This month in math grade 4 students finished up their subtraction unit and are starting geometry and angles. In grade 5, students are working on multiplication. For literacy, students wrote an opinion writing piece on the price of food in the Arctic compared to in Alberta. In science, students finished up the weather watch unit by completing a creative group project. In social studies, students have finished talking about many of the regions of Canada, including the plains, Canadian shields and Arctic regions. Next month we are excited to start some Christmas themed writing, storytelling and artwork.



Grade 5/6



November has been another busy and exciting month in Grade 5/6! In ELA, we read the storybook Sergeant Billy and had a discussion about what life was like for the soldiers during the war. We created some beautiful poppy artwork to display during the Remembrance Day assembly. We have continued with our spelling units, learning about parts of speech, and parts of a complete sentence. We are working on writing entertaining beginnings for narrative stories and creating posters of our favorite onomatopoeia. This month in Social 6, we are comparing Representative Democracy with Direct Democracy. In Social 5, we have learned about 2 of the regions in Canada: the Cordillera and Plains. We have finished our Sky Science unit this month and thoroughly enjoyed practicing our moon phases with oreos!







Grade 7





activities: deer camp, Metis week, and digital skills week. In Math we have been working on linear relations, graphing coordinates and fractions units. The students enjoyed using math manipulatives and playing games to connect to math outcomes learned. In Language Arts we have started a novel study called Island of the Blue Dolphins which is about a 12 year old Native American girl stranded on an island for many years. We have continued to work on adding descriptive words into our predictions, summaries and endings. In Science we finished up our unit on plants for Food and Fibre and will be moving into a Heat and Temperature unit. In Social Studies we are continuing with Canadian explorers, English and French settlements units. The students will be making their own explorer stamps. The grade seven class finished up their fourth week of leather work and will be moving onto clay work next.

November has been a mild month but a busy month at school with many

Grade 8

In math class, Grade 8 is diving into algebraic equations. They're figuring out the secrets behind solving all sorts of equations – from the easy ones to the more tricky ones. It's not just about learning rules; they're getting how algebra works.

In Language Arts, Grade 8 is going on a reading adventure with a novel. Students will be learning about the characters, themes, and everything that makes a story great. This isn't just about reading; it's about loving stories and understanding them in a new way.

Native Language

In this month of November, students learned about the Mahihkan/Wolf and about humility. Students created their own humility stories and recognized how to be more humble in the future. Students also helped create a wreath with indigenous soldiers on the poppies and some even used their own family members! The following week was Metis week and we did a different activity every day. We did moccasin making, jigging, Louis Riel research, and then made our own Metis sash bracelets. Next month we will be focusing on the new theme of Winter in our daily projects and assignments.
